

Overpumping of the Willcox Basin isn't just destroying roads and sinking the very land we stand on...



...it's also destroying our homes, like Janet Randall's. Her home is falling apart and had to be structurally reinforced due to land subsidence.

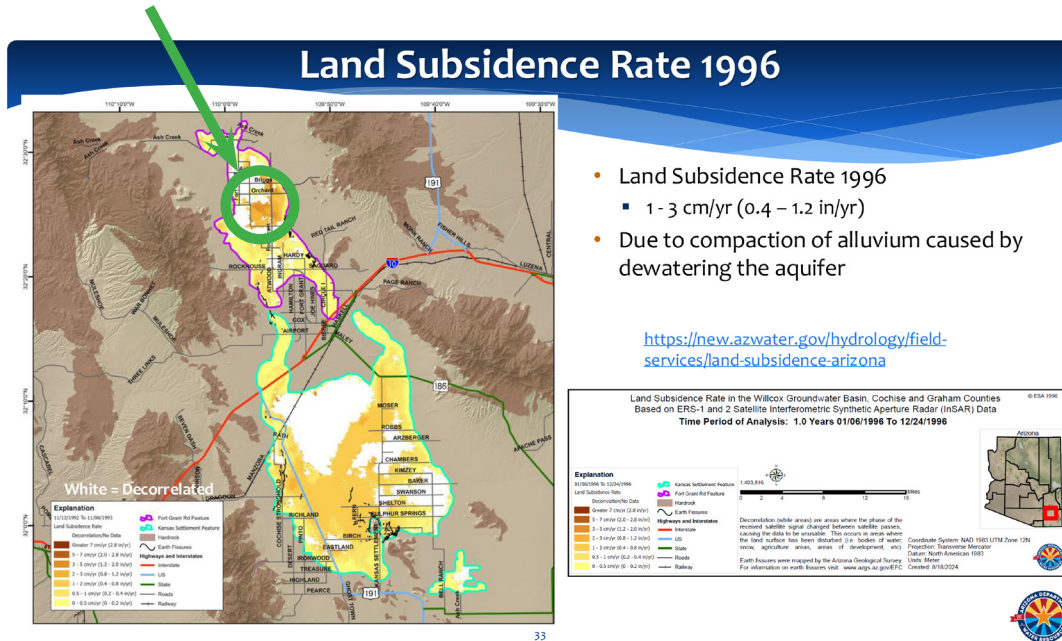


Janet first found noticeable damage to her home around 2012. Most of the house is around 70 years old, so it's stood for a long time. Her home only began breaking in half after the rate of subsidence accelerated to over 3 inches per year in her immediate area.

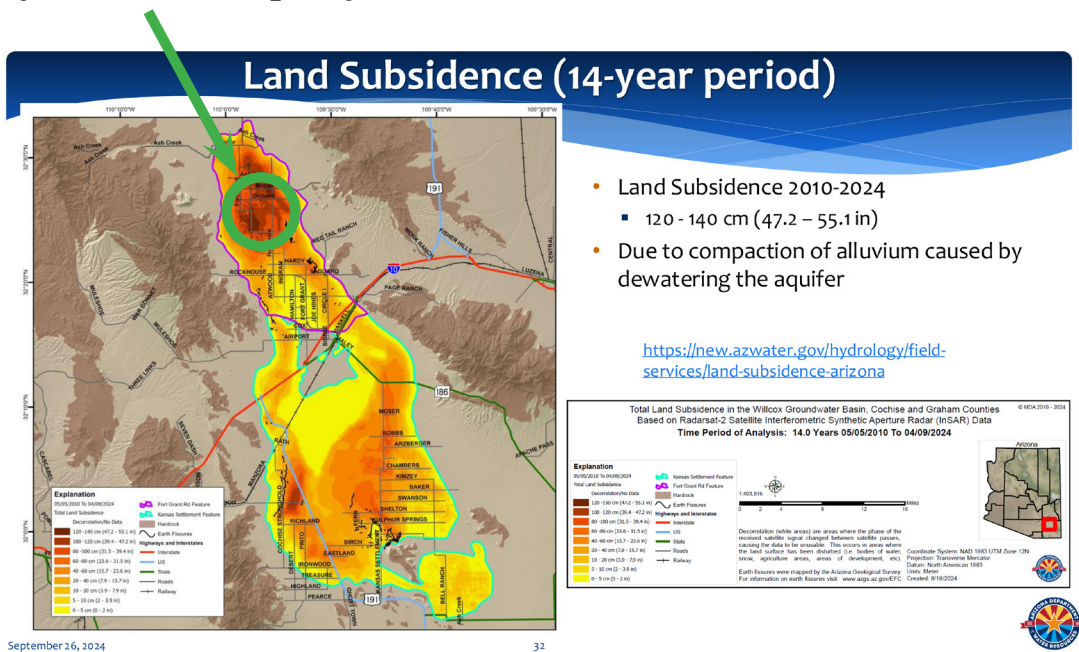
"I live where the ground is subsiding due to overpumping. It has subsided over 2 1/2 feet in 14 years. My neighbor to the west has a well that has been destroyed by uneven subsidence. Her well casing is torn in half. It would cost her \$50,000 to repair. My neighbor to the south is having to haul water because of the drop in water level. Also, due to uneven subsidence, my house is broken in half and is now unsellable, and unsafe!"

When Janet bought her home in Willcox the subsidence rate was about 1.2 inches a year.



Now her home is in an area that suffers heavily from subsidence, with the land sinking at a rate of roughly 3.5 inches per year.



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
